District Profile

The Oregon Park District is a parks and recreation municipality in Oregon, Illinois. The Oregon Park District was formed in December of 1966. The Districts' service area covers approximately 102 square miles serving over 7,000 residents. The Districts' primary recreation facility, Nash Recreation Center, houses the administrative offices, as well as meeting rooms, a gymnasium, fitness center and indoor pool. The District owns or manages 10 Park Sites totaling 150 acres.











RECREATION & EVENTS

The District publishes three seasonal activity guides each year. The activity guides offer hundreds of activities, sports leagues, special events and many other recreational opportunities. In addition, the Children's Center provides preschool to students September through May. The Extended Time program and Camp Oh-Pea-Dee provides after-school care at Oregon Elementary School and Summer Camp for school-aged children.

Of respondents were 'very satisfied' or 'satisfied' with recreation opportunities




Of respondents felt the fees charged were a good value. 4.7% did not agree and 17.5% were unsure.




Of community households believe the Oregon Park District improves their property value and quality of life.


FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

Fiscal planning and budget preparation are essential activities that help the Oregon Park District operate responsibly, effectively and efficiently. The District has utilized financial best practices to help position itself for long term sustainability.

The District concluded fiscal year 2022 exceeding its original financial and budget expectations. All fund balance goals were met. Total fund balances at end of year were \$2,079,374, which was 6.34% greater than the original budget.


Fiscal Year 2022 Revenues

The District total revenue for 2022 was \$5,074,057 slightly greater than the \$5,060,896 in 2021. The District utilizes other sources of funding for capital projects and long term maintenance through the issuance of annual rollover general obligation bonds. The District issued a \$1,484,000 bond in January of 2022, which was repaid in November of the same year. Below is a breakdown of the District annual Revenue sources.



Fiscal Year 2022 Expenses

Total District expenditures for 2022 were \$5,103,894, which was 9.3% greater than in 2021. The increased expenditures were a direct result of additional programming and facility usage following the pandemic restraints in 2020 and 2021. Primary expenses include capital projects, debt service payments and personnel. Overall operations and direct expenses returned to near pre-pandemic levels in 2021. Overall expense breakdown for the District is consisent with prior



OPD has received over \$2.5 million dollars in grants since 2011. These grants help the District create great recreation spaces for our community without increasing taxes.







PROPERTY TAXES

The Districts' annual property tax levy provides tax dollars for operational uses for each fiscal year. The tax generated by the District is a calculation of the property tax levy, the property tax rate and the equalized assessed value (EAV). The Districts' overall tax collection and tax rate has remained very consistent over the last 10 years.

The District strives to be a good steward of our community's tax dollars by making every effort to provide the best services and facilities possible, with the least amount of impact to the local tax payers. Fiscal tax planning and budget preparation are essential activities that help the District operate effectively and efficiently.

Tax Effect on Homeowners

The average City of Oregon homeowner paid about 4.34% of their property tax bill to the Park District for the 2021 tax year (taxes payable in 2022). The average homeowners tax liability was estimated to be approximately \$161.22.



CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS

The District annually completes capital projects and purchases long-term equipment. Project expenses are approved with the Annual Budget and Appropriation Ordinance each year. The District utilizes a 5 year rolling capital improvement plan that incorporates short term needs and required improvements to District infrastructure.

Capital Improvement Funding

The District utilizes General Obligation Bonds, which are secured by a pledge of the issuer's property taxing power, to complete its capital improvements. The Park District uses the funds from these bonds to fund capital improvements and development, to maintain and improve parks and facilities, acquire land and replace outdated equipment.

Projects Completed in 2022

Park East Deck Overlook

The entire deck overlook at Park East was replaced and redesigned with composite decking and wire railings.

Pickleball Courts

Two new outdoor pickleball courts were added to Mix Park. The courts are heavily used and have been a welcome addition to Mix Park.

Mini Pitch Court and Park West Trails

The District installed a mini pitch court adjacent to the tennis courts at Park West. The first 4x4 league was played in July. The trail system was also expanded for increased ADA access to the soccer fields.

Other Improvements

The District completed many other improvements to parks and facilities in 2022. Other notable improvements included repainting the Nash pool, resealing the gym floor and submitting the ITEP Trail Grant from Park East to Lowden State Park. Park improvements included shelter repairs and roofing, asphalt repaving, path extensions and new park maintenance equipment.



OPD received a playground grant of \$43,726 in 2022 to help install a new playground at Mix Park.



The District created a long term capital replacement fund in 2019. The fund will help the District plan for large capital improvements and changes to its operating structure in the future. The District contributed \$70,000 in 2022 and finished the year with a fund balance of \$280,572.





Scholarship Fund
